As we celebrate our 20th year at Andean Health & Development, we are seeing the next generation of health care leaders emerge as a result of the work and training we do at our hospitals.

Dr. Miguel Obregon and I recently witnessed tangible evidence of AHD "moving the needle." Miguel is a 2012 graduate of our family medicine residency program and now one of our teaching attending physicians. A few months ago, Miguel and I traveled to the Ministry of Health (MOH) hospital in El Carmen, a rural town in the Manabí province, about 45 minutes from our hospital in Santo Domingo. We had been invited by Diego Zambrano, one of the 45 doctors trained in a residency program that AHD created for MOH general doctors already working in rural Ecuador.

Despite having worked at public hospitals for many years, most MOH doctors have never had residency training. Our program is designed to not only deepen doctors' medical skills, but also provide a transformative experience for them to become agents for change in the public hospitals where they work.

At the hospital in El Carmen, Diego asked us to speak with a group of MOH physicians who were in the midst of their "rural year"–a year working in the countryside that the government requires after medical school. Diego wanted us to talk to them about a career in family medicine and to teach them about our residency program. The discussion went well, and there is interest in our program. However, something much more gratifying and entirely unexpected happened! We ran into three recent graduates of our residency program who are all now working at that MOH hospital. They said that when they started at the MOH hospital, they quickly noticed the low quality of inpatient care (hospitalized patients) due to so few doctors having proper training. In response, these newly minted doctors proposed to the MOH that they run the inpatient service as a team of family physicians, using the AHD approach.

**THE FIELD** 

Four years ago, the MOH did not even recognize family medicine as a specialty, but, remarkably, they agreed to this arrangement for the first time ever.

The results have been even more extraordinary. In the first month alone, the number of patients transferred to other hospitals from the El Carmen hospital dropped from 80% to a mere 20%. The family physicians (our AHD grads!) have gained the confidence of the community, of their colleagues, and even of the Ministry of Health.

When we decided to take on the larger MOH family medicine training program at Andean Health, we wondered if something like this could happen. Now it's happening! The transformation has begun.

Thank you all for your belief in our process and your support of our team in Ecuador. I must admit, after seeing the fruits of our labor so clearly on display, I welled up a bit on the ride home!
